World Wildlife Day 3rd: World Wildlife Day is an opportunity to celebrate the many beautiful and varied forms of wild fauna and flora & to raise awareness

British Pie Week 3rd to 9th: Celebrate the humble pie in all its glory!

Pancake Day 4th: Pancake Day or Shrove Tuesday is the day before Lent begins, when people would traditionally use up all their fat and eggs by making pancakes.



World Book Day 6th: Annual celebration of books and reading celebrated by reading, book related activities and dressing up as characters from books.

British Science Week 7th Mar to 16th Mar : British Science Week is a ten-day celebration of science, technology, engineering and maths.

International Women's Day 8th: A worldwide celebration of women's rights and celebrating the social, economic, cultural and political achievements of women.

St. Patrick's Day 17th: Ireland's national day celebrates the Irish patron saint, Patrick. Food Waste Action Week 17th Mar to 23rd: A whole week of action to raising awareness of the environmental consequences of wasting food, and promoting activities that help to reduce the amount of food we waste.

Global Recycling Day 18th: A day to recognize, and celebrate, the importance recycling plays in preserving our precious primary resources and securing the future of our planet. It is a day for the world to come together and put the planet first.

World Sleep Day 14th: A celebration of sleep and a call to action on important issues related to sleep, including medicine, education, social aspects and driving.

Spring Equinox (Northern Hemisphere) 20th: Today is the first day of astronomical spring in the northern hemisphere (Spring or Vernal Equinox). From today the days will get longer.

World Frog Day 20th: A celebration of frogs which are an important indicator of an ecosystem's health and help to keep the ecosystem balanced.



Red Nose Day 21st: The day when people across the land join forces to raise money for brilliant causes in the UK and around the world, by having a good laugh! World Poetry Day 21st:

International Day of Forests 21st : A day to celebrate the importance of all types of forests.

Earth Hour 22nd: Organised by the World Wildlife Fund, individuals, organisations and businesses are asked to turn off non-essential electric lights for one hour.

World Water Day 22nd: This day is about promoting the importance of water to our survival, and highlighting the 2.2 billion people living without access to safe water in the world.

Their overall vision is:

In a time when The Church of England is facing many challenges and trials on many different levels, it was encouraging to meet serving ministers who felt able to be so open and honest about their own challenges and who were willing to share wisdom, sometimes hard won, and embrace questions that helped us all consider how we might continue to lead as steady, faithful ministers, sharing the gospel and Good News of Jesus in an increasingly troubled and turbulent landscape.

In the book of Proverbs, there is a Proverb that says:

"Know also that wisdom is like honey for you: If you find it, there is a future hope for you and your hope will not be cut off." (Proverbs 24:14)

The public are welcomed to all meetings of the Parish Council which start at 7pm and are held at St Oswald's Church Meeting Room. Burneside.


